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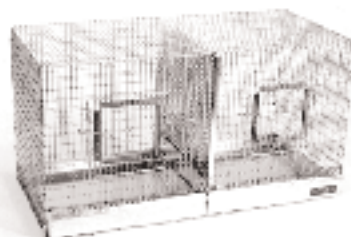

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Breeding for Quality: Sex-Linked Traits in Finches

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Higher organisms have a significant number of chromosome pairs. All but one pair is shared by both sexes. The shared pairs are known as autosomal chromosomes. The remaining pair, known as the sex chromosomes, distinguishes the sexes. In humans, males can be distinguished from females by the presence of the Y chromosome. Women have two X chromosomes (XX) and males have one X and one Y (XY). Because the Y chromosome is present only in men, it contains little genetic information that is essential for basic life function. If this were not true, women would be missing some genes necessary for essential processes. Instead, the Y chromosome functions almost exclusively to determine the sex of the human. Interestingly, in birds and some insects it is not the male that has the unique sex-determining chromosome, but the female. Using the common designations, female birds would be XY and male XX. In order to avoid confusion with mammal genetic diagrams, the standard way to express sex chromosomes in birds is ZW for hens and ZZ for cocks. I will use these symbols in this article.

Those of us that are interested in the color mutations of cage birds know that sooner or later we must come to grips with their genetics if we are to obtain the desired color combinations. Yet, to this day I encounter hobbyists that are clueless about such matters and either inbreed to maintain a certain color or just perform random matings, hoping for the best. Usually, the results are disappointing since a large number of normal colored birds begin to appear as recessive genes become masked by dominant genes.

In this article, I will explain in text and graphics how to manage a trait whose genetic control resides on a sex chromosome. Table 1 below shows you some of the most important color morphs that are controlled by genes on the Z chromosome. To my knowledge all sex-linked color mutations are recessive to normal with the exception of the **yellow body** mutation in the Gouldian Finch, which is a codominant trait (split males are diluted, double factor males have yellow bodies).

Since hens only have one Z chromosome, hens carrying a Z-linked mutation will be visuals as there is no dominant allele to mask the expression of the mutation. In other words, hens cannot be split for a sex-linked mutation. Males, on the other hand, are ZZ. So a male can be split for the mutation and still look normal (i.e. wild type for the trait). The only way to prove he is a split male is to mate him and observe his female offspring or have a pedigree that shows he must be split because you know the genetic makeup of his parents.

Pairing birds with sex-linked mutations is fun. If the pairings are planned with knowledge of sex-linked inheritance, it allows you to sex the birds while they are still in the nest box, a great treat for those of us struggling with sexing monomorphic species like Society Finches. In the following figures I use the **pearl** mutation of the Society Finch as my example. Pearls are kept in a self background meaning they have no white feathers (i.e. are not pied). Pearls are easy to distinguish from chocolates since **pearl** turns chocolate to a mocha color

and it imparts a variable amount silver-gray to certain body parts. Keep in mind that any sex-linked mutation on Table 1 can be substituted for **pearl** in the figures below with the same result, except for **yellow body** in Gouldians where split males look dilute, not yellow.

In all the Figures below, I have reduced their complexity by showing only the sex chromosomes; and if only one genetic type of sperm is possible from a given male, I did not depict multiples. I used letter symbols only for the genes that I'm concerned with in the specific example. Note that you can follow the lines leading from the final offspring to the egg and sperm that combined to give rise to them.

In Figure 1 we see just how useful a visual male for a sex-linked trait can be. When a pearl male is mated to a chocolate hen, all of his daughters will be pearls and all of his sons will be choco-

lates split for **pearl**. In this case the young can be sexed in the nest box and you can be positive that the chocolate males are split for **pearl**. Keep in mind that **pearl** is recessive.

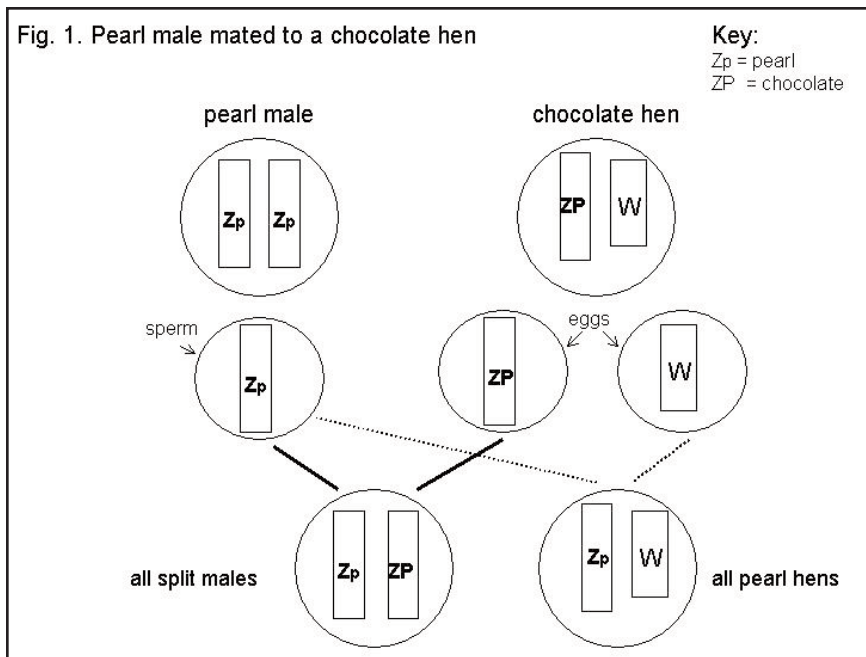


Fig. 2. A split for pearl male mated to a chocolate hen

So, what about pairings that use a split male? Here's a real example of the result. I once got an email from a woman who bought two chocolate Society Finches from a pet shop in New Jersey (very close to where Shimpei Tanaguchi, one of my collaborators in the pearl importation, used to live). Her chocolates produced a few offspring that were "silvery hens". I immediately suspected that they might be pearls. Figure 2 shows how this can happen. If the male happened to be split for **pearl** he would produce on average one pearl for every four babies and it would always be a hen. It is the **pearl** sperm that joined with the W chromosome that made the pearl hen. This pearl hen is depicted in the third circle on the bottom line of circles on Figure 2. On

Z_P = chocolate

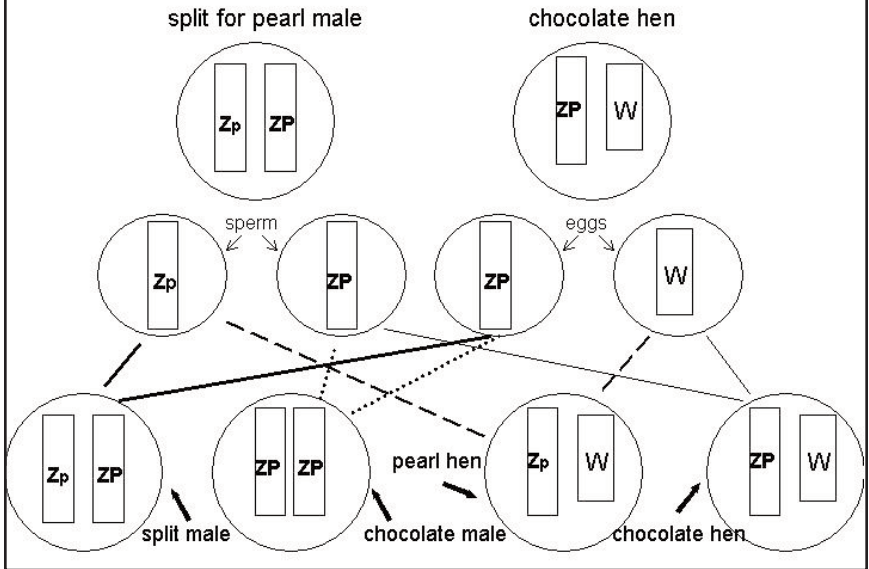
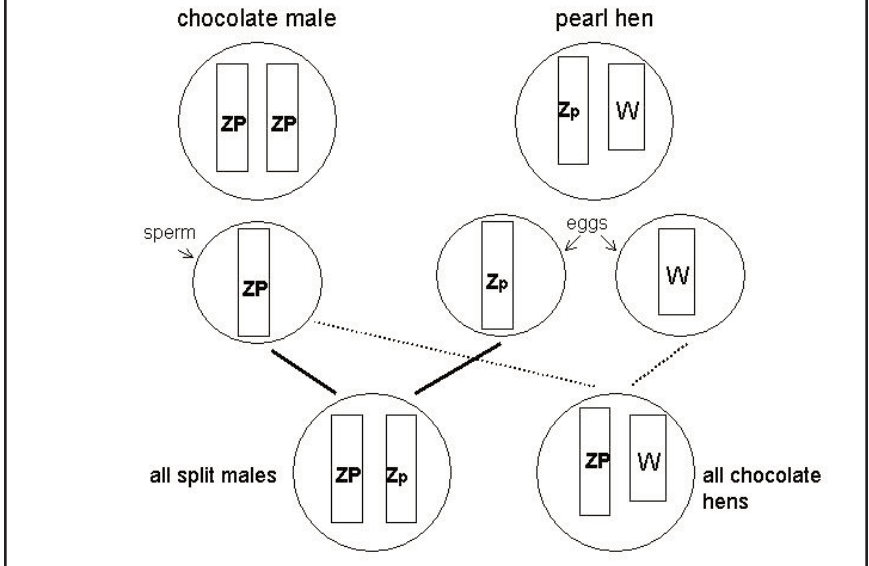


Fig. 3. Chocolate male mated to pearl hen

average, a pairing between a split for **pearl** male and a chocolate hen produces a ratio of 1:1:1:1 chocolate male : split male : chocolate hen : pearl hen. It would be impossible to know which male is split without performing test matings with him.

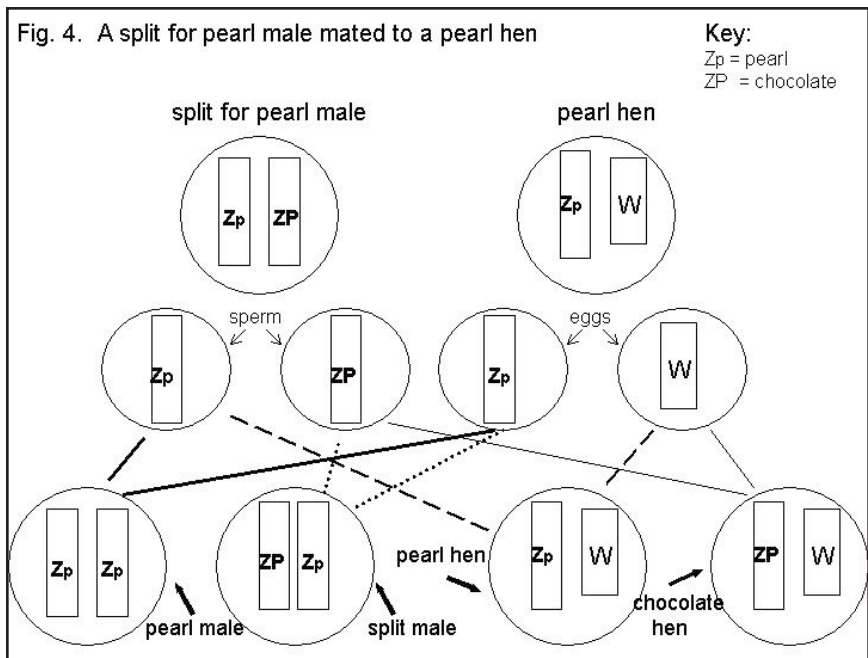
If you acquired a pearl hen and mated it to one of your chocolate males, all the babies would appear chocolate (Figure 3). Once you could sex them by song, you could be assured that all the males were splits and all the hens were chocolates. So unlike the pairing in Figure 2 at least you know the genetics of all of the offspring. In Figure 3, we see that a chocolate male mated to a pearl hen yields a 1:1 ratio of split males: chocolate hens.

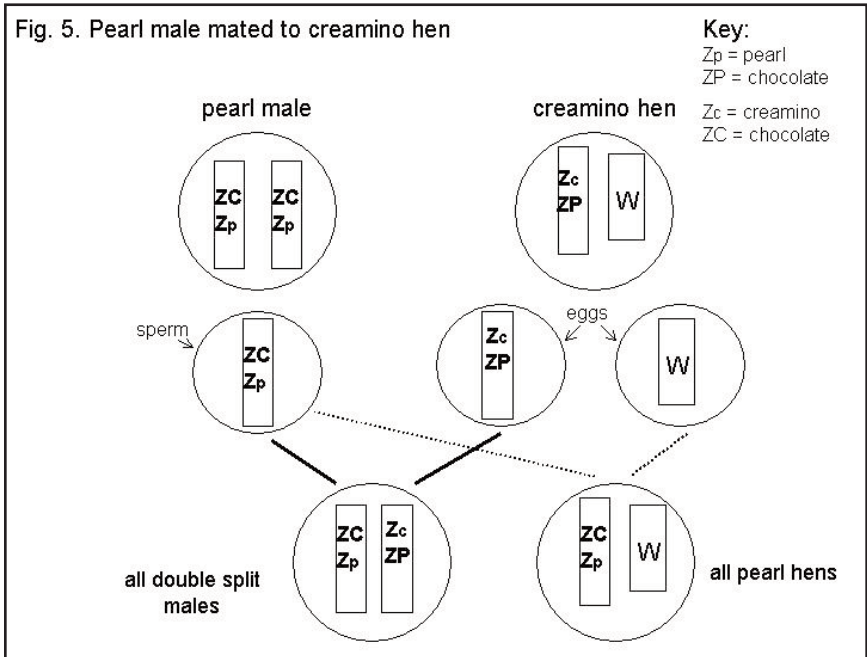
In Figure 4 below we see the expectation if a split male is paired with a pearl hen. On average, one can expect a ratio of 1:1:1:1 pearl male: split male: pearl

hen: chocolate hen from this pairing. This is another pairing where you can eventually figure out the makeup of all the offspring because the males are either pearl or split and no chocolate males that are not split for pearl could ever result from the pairing.

Figures 1 to 4 are informative because they visually depict the results of all possible pairings with a single sex-linked trait. Note that only in Figure 2, where a split male is mated to a chocolate hen, is there any confusion about the genetic makeup of the male offspring. In all other pairings you know the genotype of the offspring.

Another item worth mentioning is the linkage issues with sex-linked genes. In my article in the last issue of the NFSS Journal, which was on linkage, you learned that two mutations on the same chromosome cannot be easily combined if they start out being on separate birds.





The same goes for sex-linked genes. For example, if you wanted to make pearl creaminos to see what they would look like, it would not be easy. The resulting offspring would be all pearl hens and all chocolate males split for *pearl* and *creamino* (see Figure 5 above).

Even if you paired the resulting brothers and sisters you would not recover the double mutant, unless crossing over occurred.

Finally, I need to mention what an allelic series is, because in Zebra Finches there appears to be at least three alleles of one sex-linked gene that result in similar but distinct phenotypes. What this means is that at the same point on the chromosome different forms of a similar mutation have occurred on separate birds. Chestnut flanked white (CFW), continental CFW, lightback, and perhaps a few others form such a series. Because these are on the same location on the chromosome, they cannot be combined

on one chromosome – there is no opportunity for crossing over to occur, as has happened with fawn and lightback, both sex-linked genes that are far enough apart from each other on the Z chromosome to allow crossing over to occur.

The allelic series reveals allele relationships in split males. Males that are split for two forms of the gene (e.g. **CFW** and **lightback**) are not normal grays that are double splits. Rather, the two alleles interact, sort of acting as one in the sense that you do get mutant expression (i.e. visuals), but with one having a dominant effect the other. To read more about such interesting phenomena go to www.efinch.com and read the sections on CFW, fawn, and lightback in the Zebra Finch variety section.

As you can see, the more we know, the less we know. In a species such as the Zebra Finch, where the number of mutations keep piling up, we are bound to come up with new puzzles. Perhaps sex-

linked genes can interact in strange ways with genes on autosomal chromosomes? By understanding more about genetics we will be able to control the outcome of our pairings and hopefully create new and exciting color combinations in the future.

In the next issue of the NFSS Journal we move away from single gene traits and begin to discuss the breeding

strategies used for quantitatively inherited traits such as bird shape and size.

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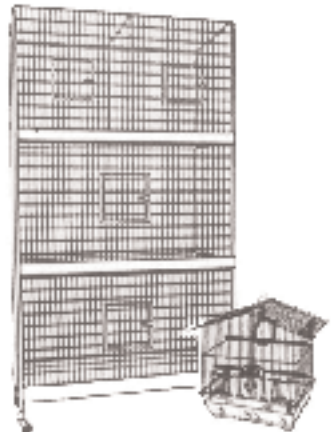
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The 2004 U.S. National Cage Bird Show Lansing, Michigan, Nov. 14-18, 2004

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Lynne and Mike West display the Higgins Trophy awarded to them for Best Finch/Softbill at the 2004 National Cage Bird Show Banquet.

Our first visit to the U.S. National was a memorable one. Last year, in Windsor, and again this year, two U.S. judges had commented on our Lady Gouldian finches, and suggested we take them to the National. Since the show was close at hand, we decided to make the trip down. Then we wondered about how to take our birds down over the border. After a 'few' phone calls, and a lot of legwork by Lynne, we got the necessary documents (an import/export permit from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department), and set up a visit by Dr. Michael Taylor, an accredited avian veterinarian from the

University of Guelph, to inspect our birds. We then had to take the paperwork to Agriculture Canada to get the necessary approvals. Finally, we needed the U.S. money orders to pay for the inspections at the U.S. border by Fish and Wildlife and the U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarian. We set off on the Thursday morning and crossed the Windsor-Detroit Bridge border crossing at about 1:00 pm. After getting lost in the truck traffic, we finally found the U.S. building, met with the Fish and Wildlife Officer and then we waited for the vet inspection. With hundreds of canaries, and truck loads of

pigs, all waiting on the same vet, it took a while to get out and continue on our way.

By the time we got to Lansing, it was late afternoon and we checked into our hotel and then checked the birds into the show. All birds must be entered on the Thursday prior to judging on Friday, which begins at 8 am. When we had our birds on the bench, we were disappointed to find that we had the only Gouldians in the show until a few more were entered later. The show was held in the Convention Centre, with a huge exhibition hall, separate rooms for sale birds and four divisions of singing canaries, and with a good number of commercial sellers in a separate booth area. It was a lovely venue, especially since it was lavishly decorated for the Christmas season.

The total entry in the Finch Division was about 125 birds. There were plenty of Zebra finches, and an assortment of other European, African, Central and South American, and East Asian finches and softbills. The birds to beat were a Touraco, a Cuban, and a Shafttail. Canada was well represented, with Rickie Gaskin sending down birds with Vince Moase. Grant Rishman from Victoria also attended but couldn't bring birds. In addition, there was a very strong group of canary exhibitors from Ontario and Quebec.

On Friday, judging began and we took our seats to watch. The judge, Armando Lee from Florida, is the First Vice-President of the National Finch and Softbill Society, and he began with the largest class of birds, the Zebra finches. The best Zebra finch was entered by Rickie Gaskin from Ontario, and that bird went on to be fifth best bird in show. We were fortunate to have our pastel blue Gouldian judged Best in Show, winning the Higgins trophy for Best in Division. That completes the double, with the same bird having won the Canadian National early in October in Ottawa. Lynne was more nervous during the Best

in Division judging than at any of the Canadian shows. As the judging went on, other exhibitors were kidding her saying that if she wrung her hands any more, than they would fall off!

Canadians were at the top of two other divisions, Mohamed El-Ayari (Moe) from Brampton won the Lipochrome Division. He was also winner of Canadian National in Ottawa. Tony Medeiros won the Fife division. Rado Pagac's canary was the Best Melanin Mosaic and was seventh overall in the Melanin Classic Division, while the Gatto Aviary was second best in the Melanin Classic Division with the best Black Red Intensive. Altogether, the Canadian contingent did very well, I think, and went home very happy.

The cage tags are opened after the judging except for the winner of each Division. This is because the judging for the Scannell trophy (Best in Show) happens on Saturday afternoon and the results are not announced until the banquet that Saturday night. So we had to contain our excitement until later. On Friday night, we attended the social evening where there was a buffet dinner and drinks. The spread was quite impressive, as they even had a fountain of melted chocolate that you could dip fruit and marshmallows in. The younger exhibitors loved it (us included!!) Then the birds donated by the previous year's Higgins winners were auctioned to provide funds for the next show. The birds that raised the most money was a pair of beautiful Pekin Robins at \$650.00 U.S. (Editor's Note: This beautiful pair of Pekin Robins was donated by our own NFSS President, Sally Huntington.) The total raised was about \$4,600.

Saturday morning was spent at the meeting of the National Finch and Softbill Society, of which we are members. This brought an unexpected bonus. The NFSS presents a trophy to the Best Softbill in show. However, this year they

instituted a new trophy, the Bill Parlee trophy, for the Best Finch in Show. Bill was a founder of the society, and he judged our birds once, at the 100th CAS show in 1994. So it was a great surprise and honor for us to be awarded the original trophy for the Best Finch in Show. The afternoon was spent socializing and looking at the other birds in the show. The U.S. national has eighteen divisions of birds, including a division for peach faced lovebirds, a second for eye-ring and rarer lovebirds, and a junior division. Each of these divisions had many entries! The US exhibits a lot of hook-bills, including lovebirds, cockatiels and parrotlets. This show had no exhibition budgerigars, although there were a couple of "wild-type" budgerigars. There are also good entries in most canary classes, including quite a few rarer varieties such as Scots fancy, Gibber Italicus and Japanese Hosa.

On Saturday night, the banquet is held, with about 300-400 people present. After dinner, winners of essay competitions for children of different ages were announced, and winning essays were read aloud to the guests. Then the Higgins division winners are announced, with lots of photographers present! It is quite an occasion, and the trophies are enormous. Finally the winner of the best singing canary (which was a roller canary), and then the Best in Show

(Scannell trophy) are announced. The Best in Show was a beautiful Gloster canary.

After dinner, each exhibitor then had to wait to be escorted into the hall to take the birds out. This was done in order of entry, so as exhibitor 195, we had a long wait! Finally, we received our birds, packed them up, and went back to the hotel for a good rest. On Sunday morning, we met with others from the Canadian contingent and came home with little delay at the border.

Just a final note to finish up the story of our memorable trip. I would like to extend a special thank you to Rado Pagac. He took photographs, but more importantly, he spent time with us on Saturday to complete the U.S. export documents on-line, and was very helpful in escorting us back. As first-timers, we didn't know the procedures, and were quite nervous. He helped a lot. Another thank you to Vince

and Kendra Moase and to Grant Rishman. We spent a lot of time socializing with them, and enjoying the show together with them, especially at the Saturday banquet. Since Lynne and I have been showing birds over these last 14 years, Vince has provided us with a wealth of information on birdkeeping, and his congratulations on our U.S. win meant a lot to us. Finally, we met and reconnected with many friends from the bird world from the U.S. and Canada, and really enjoyed the experience and companionship.

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Breeding the Speckled Mousebird (*Colius striatus*)

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Speckled Mousebirds are native to South Africa. Their habitat is forest edges and clearings and also parks and gardens in towns. They are rather drab but very entertaining birds. The sexes are alike making buying true pairs difficult. To be sure of a pair, birds should be DNA sexed.

Adults measure 30-36 cm including the tail which can measure 17-24 cm. They have unusual feathers - almost hair like, the tail is long and stiff, and they also have a crest which can be raised or laid flat on the head.

They are fruit eaters and also eat some greenfood and live food in the wild.

Mousebirds are so called because of their habit of scurrying through the undergrowth. They have a pampodactyl foot which means they can point all four toes forward. They aren't very strong fliers, preferring to run along perches and aviary wire. They can perch normally, but prefer to hang from perches with splayed legs. At night they roost together in a tight ball, hanging from a favourite perch with heads up. With feathers fluffed up to keep warm, it's difficult to know how many birds are there.

I bought my birds from the National at the NEC 2002. The dealer didn't know if they were a pair, but they were in very good condition.

The birds were put in an indoor flight measuring 8ft long, 3ft wide and 8ft high. The bird room is heated by an electric, oil filled radiator at 65c. Lights are on from midday until midnight and work on a dimmer.

I have covered the walls and ceilings in the bird room with white plastic cladding and the floors are tiled making cleaning very easy. The floors of the flights are filled with a wood based cat litter as mousebirds are very messy birds. I also keep Lorikeets and cat litter is the best floor covering I've found.

The birds also have access to an outside planted flight measuring 4ft long, 3ft wide and 6ft high. The plants were soon stripped of their leaves. They dislike cold damp weather and will sunbathe at every opportunity, mostly first thing in the morning to get warm.

I placed two open fronted boxes in the inside flight and placed a small amount of hay in each. I never saw the birds go near them so I also placed a ceramic canary nest pan 7ft high on the front wall of the aviary. I supplied more hay, coconut fibre and canary nesting material. I didn't see any nest building or even see the birds carrying any material.

On the first of November, I noticed a twig sticking out from the nest pan. The only way I could inspect the nest was with

a dental mirror. There was a single white egg in the nest. Two more eggs followed - each laid two days apart.

Both parents incubated, taking turns during the day and night. Each time they went back to incubate, they added nesting material around the edge of the nest and each time they left, material would fall out. A small conifer in the outside aviary was stripped bare of all foliage.

One egg was thrown out of the nest and contained a fully formed chick on the verge of hatching. Sadly the chick died.

The first egg hatched on the 15th and the second the following day. The chicks hatch blind and are grey in colour, sparsely covered in grey down. For the first few days they resemble baby mice. The chicks have a very bright yellow tongue which is visible when the chicks gape.

Both parents fed the chicks on a great variety of fruit including sweet apple, pear, banana, grape, paw paw, mango, blackberry, elder, sharon fruit, hawthorn, nectarines, peaches, tangerines, sweet oranges, strawberries, figs (dried and fresh), cotoneaster, pyracantha, honeysuckle, holly and garden peas. Haiths softbill food is eaten in large quantities but all live food is ignored.

The chicks grew rapidly and both left the nest at ten days old. They resemble the parents except for their shorter crest and tail, darker bill and they are approximately half the size of an adult bird. The chicks couldn't fly but ran up and down the aviary wire. Both were back in the nest at night.

The parents continued to brood the chicks for a few nights. The adults were very vocal when I entered the bird room and would fly out into the outside flight, calling the young to join them. The young birds had no problem going through the bob hole into each flight. When the four birds weren't sitting on the nest they would huddle together hanging from a perch in the bird room.

My mousebirds have never bathed in water. They prefer to dust bathe. I provide a shallow bowl filled with a mixture of play sand from a garden centre sold for children's sand pits and peat. They never bathe together - never more than two at a time.

Mousebirds don't have down feathers and dislike wet weather. In the wild mousebirds are frequently found dead hanging from a perch after a downpour. The birds get soaked and die from hypothermia.

Fresh water is provided a couple of times a day as it soon gets soiled with fruit and droppings. Mousebird droppings are loose and end up everywhere. You must be prepared to clean the flights regularly.

In the USA mousebirds are very popular and hand reared birds make excellent pets. They are very playful and love human company.

The next two rounds of eggs were all dead in shell due, I think, to interference by the two youngsters. They have now been moved to another aviary.

The most recent nest contained three eggs; the first was laid on the 27th of February, the second was laid on the 2nd of March and the last on the 3rd of March. Both birds shared incubation again and the first egg hatched on the 9th of March, followed four days later by the second. The first youngster was closed rung on the 13th with a size L ring from the IOA. Both birds left the nest together, but sadly the younger chick couldn't make it back into the nest that night and was found dead on the aviary floor the following morning.

Mousebirds are excellent aviary birds. They are quiet, very interesting, easy to feed and are relatively free breeders.

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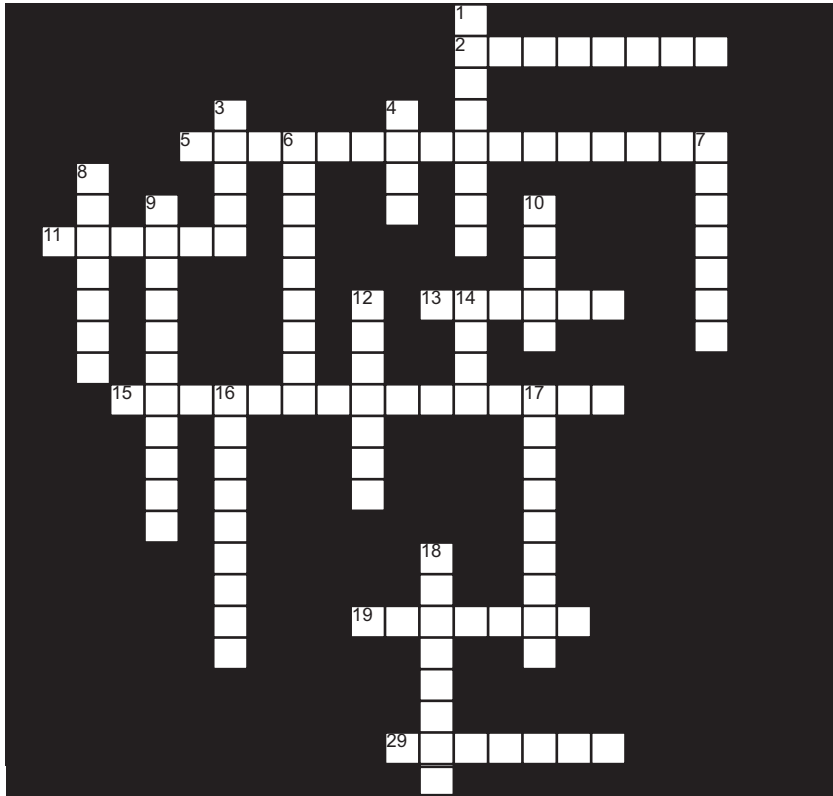

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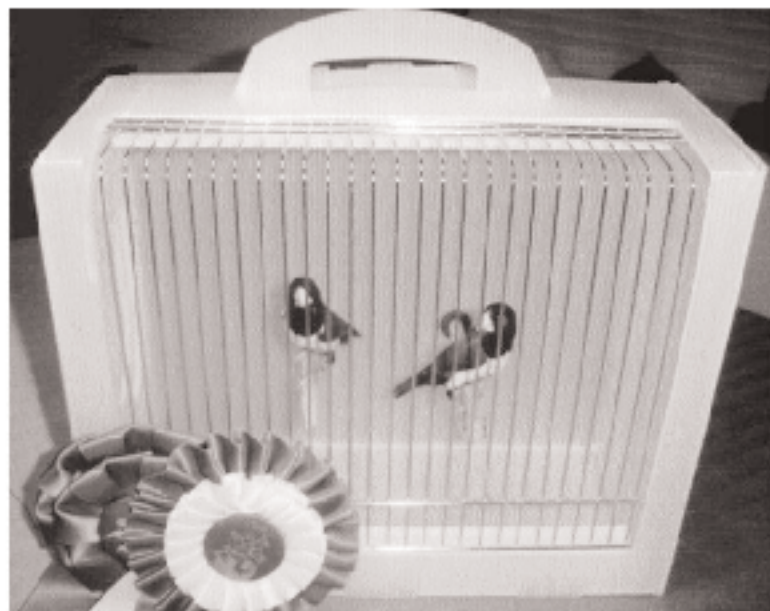
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YOYETTE RETURNS FROM COZUMEL - AND HOW!

Yoyette was last seen looking a bit bedraggled and weary, with her luggage in beak. She was not willing to disclose her travel destination. As she was leaving, she was questioned about potential

2004 Exhibitor Awards

An NFSS exhibitor achieves Champion Exhibitor status when he or she has accumulated 50 points or more during a calendar year.

In 2004 NFSS had two **Champion Exhibitors**:

K.J. Brown	94 points
Lisa Murphy	68 points

K.J. Brown's incredible 94 points in one season were earned at four shows. His successes included 14 point-accumulating birds (13 NFSS closed banded birds from 2004, and one from 2002). Of special note are his pairs of Self Chocolate Societies that earned points at three shows. One of his Societies, common to all three pairs, earned 14 points! Lisa Murphy earned an amazing 68 points at five shows in the southeast U.S.

We also recognize several others who had tremendous success sharing their fine birds with us in 2004: At just **two**

shows, **Ramon Colon** earned 48 points, **Clarence Culwell** earned 44 points at **three** shows, and **Kathleen Clark** accumulated 42 points at several shows. Two others with great show seasons earned NFSS points for the first time - **Doug White** with 30 points and novice **Brianna Morrison** with 29 points. Honorable mention must go out to two exhibitors who were not members, and therefore did not have points recorded in 2004 - "Mr. Exhibitor" himself in the southeast, Billy Cochran was eligible for 45 points, and Dennis Burhans for 35 points.

An exhibitor who accumulates 200 or more points during his or her lifetime achieves NFSS Exhibitor of Excellence status. Approaching this milestone are **K.J. Brown** (185 pts), **Armando Lee** (168 pts), **Clara Gontero** (155 pts), and **Lisa Murphy** (145 pts).

Thank you ALL for sharing so many wonderful birds at our shows!

The Best Birds at the Shows in 2004

NFSS judges stated that at several shows in 2004, the best bird in the Finch and Softbill Division could have been any one of the top several birds. At other shows, the differences in the overall quality of the birds on exhibit were more evident. But if one wanted to generalize about the birds on exhibit in 2004 based on the winners at the shows, one would

have to say it was a good, strong year for Gouldians, which placed first at 8 out of 42 shows in 2004. This was an increase from 2003, during which five Gouldians won best in division. Zebra Finches also showed an improvement in 2004, winning at seven shows (they won at two shows in 2003).

Society Finches did not fare as well in 2004. Two Societies placed first in 2004, whereas in 2003 they won six shows. Neither winner was a newer, European variety; both were Self Fawns. Which is not to say that the newer variety Societies aren't holding their own; some incredible work is being done with them around the country. Stay tuned! But it was a very good year for Waxbills, which won at 7 NFSS shows in 2004, similar to 2003. Softbills won at 6 shows this past

year, down from 9 in 2003. Rounding out this year's winners were a Button Quail, a Crimson Pileated and two Cuban Melodious wins, a European Goldfinch, 4 Australian finches, and 3 other Africans.

This review of the winners does not begin to touch on the variety of species and mutations brought to our shows! ***Thank you to every one of you who support this glorious outpouring of the fruits of our hobby!***

NFSS Exhibition - Very Alive and Doing Really, Really Well!

There were MANY familiar names and faces this year on the NFSS show circuit! The show halls were filled with returning new and previous members, along with many long-term, loyal members, all sharing their birds with others in our finch and softbill hobby. *What a great year for seeing the birds!*

Something pretty exciting is still going on at the National Cage Bird Show – NFSS had 23 exhibitors there! This was followed by the remarkably warm Eastside Finch Connection show in Oregon with 17 exhibitors. 15 exhibitors supported the fall show of the Asociacion de Criadores de Finches del Este in Puerto Rico. Around the country, we saw 13 exhibitors at Birds of a Feather Avicultural Society in Manchester, NH, at Texas Bird Breeders in Temple, and at NIROC in the Chicago area. Central Alabama Avicultural Society welcomed 12 exhibitors at one of their two shows, as did both the Ft. Worth Bird

Club and the unaffiliated Association des Eleveurs d'Oiseaux de Montreal. What a great job our clubs are doing encouraging the sharing and support of our show experience! *Thank you all!*

Please do remember throughout this coming year that all those working to put on a profitable and enjoyable show can always use YOUR help. Many humble hands make light work of the biggest jobs.

Top Ten NFSS Shows in 2004

We have received reports from 42 shows judged by NFSS panel judges in 2004, with entries from 186 to 8 cages. There were a total of 2,526 cages of finches and softbills exhibited, making 2004 another year of increase (2003 had entries of 2,423; 2002 had 2,148). The average show size in 2004 was 60 entries, again an increase. The median show entry was 51 cages. 91 different exhibitors placed in point-eligible positions on the top bench. This, of course, is only a portion of our total pool of exhibitors, many of whom did not place in point-eligible positions. Interestingly, as in past years, over one-third of our point-

eligible exhibitors were non-members – including MANY old friends (former NFSS members) returning for the special fun of NFSS shows, several talented novices, and even a couple of members who accidentally let their memberships lapse during the year!

For the third year in a row, the largest NFSS-affiliated show was held in Puerto Rico. Both NFSS judges who had the opportunity to judge our Puerto Rican shows this year said they saw there some of the best birds they have ever seen! Congratulations!
