



The European Society of Serinus Breeders: RELEVANCE TO AMERICAN AVICULTURE

n this issue of the Journal, I'm happy to print the first two articles in a series of six that was recently sent to me by representatives of the European Society of Serinus Breeders (ESSB). This European initiative is being undertaken to help preserve the various species of carduelan finches in European bird rooms and aviaries in light of the current ban on importation of these birds in Europe.

American aviculturists should take note of the state of affairs across the Atlantic. Just a few years ago, we ourselves could not obtain imported birds from Africa (or at least could obtain verv few) due to our country's ban on importing any CITES-listed species, even those on Appendix III. Only after Ghana delisted many bird species it had placed on Appendix III did we once again see the flow of African finches to quarantine stations in the U.S. These events, and the decision by the European Union to ban all imports of wild-caught birds, should highlight the precarious state of bird importation for us all. Relying on imported, wild-caught specimens to fill our aviaries is not a long-term avicultural strategy.

It is a virtual certainty that the future will bring more disruptions to the trade in wild birds, if not an outright permanent ban in the U.S., as the Europeans have enacted. This means that it is the primary task of aviculturists now to hone our skills at breeding any birds that we wish to have long-term access to. Just a few years ago, I remember the price of Green Singing Finches skyrocketing to \$250/pair, and they were not easy to find. Many estrildid species were almost impossible to find: lavenders. cordon bleus, fire finches, goldbreasts, and many others. Why? Because we had not managed to learn how to breed these birds in sustainable numbers so that we could maintain them in the country without imports. We see this now with the currently banned Asian species. Strawberry Finches are now very rare in this country, and those that are here tend to be old birds who are not likely to produce many offspring at this point.

If you have birds that you hope to always have in your bird room, I urge vou to learn how to produce a reliable strain of breeding birds, either by yourself or in conjunction with other aviculturists. Join Finch and Softbill Save to work with other NFSS members on creating sustainable captive populations. Document your methods that lead to success by publishing your experiences in the Journal or in other avicultural outlets. With all the many thousands of finches and softbills currently living in American bird-keepers' care, if we can't sustain our avocation in the face of the next ban, we will have no one to blame but ourselves.

ESSB: The European Society of Serinus Breeders by Huub Vervest, Gaétan Vicentini and John Santegoeds

A New Initiative for Breeders of All Serin Species

Well, here you are, a bird breeder. All of a sudden the importation of birds you want to breed has "dried up." So vou will have to do with the birds vou have available to you, at this moment. Because you sort of anticipated the ban on importation, you maybe managed to secure a spare hen or cock bird to make up an unrelated pair. But that's just about it. Luckily you know a few people with the same species, with whom you have swapped birds in the past. However, they are few and far between, because there are few breeders with the same species as yourself, let alone the same subspecies.

Anyway, you have the contacts. We all have phone numbers stacked away of people with the same species. In the meantime prices of these species go through the roof and you get inundated by people who want to purchase birds from you. Unfortunately you have to disappoint most of them, because you have never been able to breed in numbers (our species don't breed that easily) and you would rather swap the surplus birds or sell to a breeder whom you know you can approach whenever you need a bird yourself.

So at this very moment fanciers and breeders of, for instance, exotic bullfinches, exotic greenfinches, Passerinas, Desertfinches, Grossbeaks etc. will be in the same boat. In the past these birds were imported on a regular basis, but that is in the past...

So, what now? Because of access to the internet it is easy to make contacts overseas. It is because of this that some enthusiasts of Serinus species have banded together and initiated the European Society of Serinus Breeders (ESSB).

ESSB

It's a mouthful but the initiative needed a name, and this covers its aim.

European

We would be dreaming if we were thinking we have enough of these birds within our respective countries to save the Serinus species for aviculture. Furthermore, mainly due to the internet, contacts have already been laid with people in The Netherlands, Belgium, France and Germany.

Society

Above all, we did not want an organisation with a structure and restrictions that go with it. Because we were thinking globally we chose the word Society: a group of individuals with the same aims and interests.

Serinus

The bird species we are focused on are of the genus: Serinus. This is a group of some thirty species, the majority of which come (or came) from Africa.

Breeders

The aim is to preserve these bird species for European aviculture through breeding. Because importations appear out of the question, it is imperative to breed purebred birds.

ESSB is a Go-Between

We started of with the principle that the ESSB will act as a go-between, between people who want have contact with enthusiasts/breeders of the same species. To that effect a database is available for members. This database contains details of what species respective members

have and/or breed. Members can contact other members directly, without the involvement of a third party.

Furthermore, the ESSB wants to supply information on the various species/subspecies in several European birdfancy publications pertaining to, amongst other things, breeding. There is quite a bit of vagueness about the different species, especially with the species where, in the past, several subspecies were imported. It is going to be quite a task to keep the subspecies pure. For this reason it is important to know what subspecies one owns him/ herself, and which of the other members breeds this species.

We invite interested parties to visit our website www.Serinus-Society.eu If you are the owner of one or more Serinus species, please register on the website and help this initiative, which can also be of benefit to your hobby.

In three or four years, many of the birds spread around aviaries at the moment will be lost to aviculture. Working together can be the solution, but we have to act NOW. Current bird breeders determine what we will have flying around aviaries in ten years time.

You can play your part here. Sitting back is losing time...

Serinus, Alario, Dendrospiza, Chritagra, Ochrospiza, Poliospiza?

Ever since we have known the phenomenon of importing exotic birds, there has been confusion around the naming of a relatively large group of birds from – mainly – Continental Africa. For a small grey coloured seed eating bird the name "Grey Singer" was invented. Another African bird, more yellowish with a green back and nice eye markings – the cock bird of which, by the way, is also a good singer – was named "Green Singer."

If one refers to more recent publications, for instance Guide des Passereaux Granivores (Gilbert Armani, 1983) and Finches and Sparrows (Peter Clement, Alan Harris, John Davis, 1994), one will see that the aforementioned Grey Singer and Green Singer form part of a group of some thirty bird species that are grouped under the name Serinus. In older publications some of these birds are referred to by their scientific names.

Nowadays in The Netherlands and Belgium, the name "Cini's" is also used when one refers to the above-mentioned group of seed eating birds, all of whom are related to the species Serinus canaria; well known to be the forefather of the current domesticated canary.

Confusion in Names.

The scientists cannot agree as to how to classify these "canary-like" birds by name scientifically, not to mention the bird fanciers themselves! It is possible that a species has several names. This is in part due to the many subspecies there are of the genus Serinus. The German, French and Italian names are somewhat clearer as the name mostly starts or finishes with "Girlitz," "Serin," or "Canario." In more recent publications these "canary-like" birds are referred to as the genus Serinus. In German-oriented countries, this varies. In older reference books these birds can also be found under scientific names beginning with Alario, Dendrospiza, Chritagra, Ochrospiza, Poliospiza. All this represents taxonomic confusion amongst scientists and name confusion amongst bird fanciers.

CINI

Exceptions confirm the rule. Serinus alario is simply named 'Alario' or 'Alariogirlitz' in Germany. The French are a little more logical with the name 'Serin Alario.' In Italian it is also simple: 'Alario.' In the Netherlands, the bird suddenly becomes a finch: 'Alariofinch.' The English follow the relationship better than the Dutch: 'black headed canary.'

There are regular changes in the scientific names of the bird species within Serinus. For instance: 15 June 2004 in the alterations of the Clements' checklist of Birds of the World, it was published that the genus name Serinus for the "Alario" is replaced by the genus name Alario. Following this checklist, the scientific name Alario alario for the alariofinch and the white throated alariofinch or Damara alariofinch, or sometimes named Kings alariofinch, should be named (here we go again) Alario leucolaema.





Hermann Heinzel introduced the name "cini" in March 1968 in the Belgian Ornithological Association's (AOB) magazine Vogelwereld ("Birdworld"), more than likely a corruption of the French "Serin," a term already in vogue in Belgium for some time as an alternative to "canary-like birds."

ESSB

The authors have combined in an attempt to clarify the confusion over naming of birds by fanciers by compiling a list of the genus Serinus. This list gives the popular names in Dutch, supplemented by French, German, English and Italian names. In compiling this list

we used the (maybe since changed) indexing of these birds of the genus Serinus. Based on the above-mentioned, well illustrated Gilbert Armani and Peter Clement handbooks, the group of birds belonging to the genus Serinus is relatively large.

Rightly or wrongly? That is something we leave to the scientists. Our interest is in the breeding of these birds. Via the internet the interested Serinus breeders have already been contacting each other for some time. From these contacts the idea has developed to form the "European Society of Seninus Breeders" known as ESSB for short. The purpose of the ESSB is to be of service

to people interested in the Serinus species, service by way of supplying of an illustrated overview of the species and subspecies, bringing breeders into contact with each other and trying to keep these (sub)species pure for European fanciers by swapping of birds.

This is a necessity now that the importation is banned. A "Serinus" website in the Dutch, English and French languages has recently been up and running. Are you enthusiastic about the bird species in the genus Serinus? Maybe a keeper or breeder? Let us know and work with us to keep these beautiful, active, bird species in European aviculture. Visit the website www.Serinus-Society.eu and register as a fancier/breeder.

Grey singers, canaries, finches or 'cini's'? The fact is that the cock bird is a beautiful singer, that the birds often display beautiful colours, and that it is interesting to breed them. The ESSB focuses on advancing breeding in order to maintain these species for European aviculture.



The Florida Finch Show Bird Club: AN INTERVIEW WITH RON CASTANER AND TIM MCCORMICK

As this issue of the Journal goes to press, we'll be nearing the end of show season. Many have lamented the flagging interest in exhibition in the avicultural community in recent years. We seem to be going through a generational shift, where many people who were enthusiastic show organizers and participants are less active in these endeavors, but there are not many new local club members ready to take on this part of the hobby.

We need to remember that it's not just birds. Participation in all kinds of clubs and civic organizations is waning. In fact, almost every kind of social participation has plummeted in recent decades, even visiting with relatives. This is well-documented in the groundbreaking book Bowling Alone: The Collapse and Revival of American Community by sociologist Robert Putnam (2000). The title is a reference to the fact that, even though a greater percentage of the public bowls today than ever before, there is lower participation in bowling leagues.

I feel the same may be true with birds. There are lots of birdkeepers out there, but they don't seem interested in joining clubs and organizations based on their shared interests. Exhibition requires the most collective activity of all. You need a group to get together to put on a show and just sharing the knowledge of how to show birds and why it's important requires a certain level of community to exist. As more and more people spend more and more time alone, we tend to turn to more remote forms of communication (like internet groups) and less face-to-face interaction.

Luckily, there is still an active core of people out there interested in putting on a good show. Just this year, NFSS President Emeritus Ron Castaner and Tim McCormick got together to form a new show in Florida, which turned out to be a great success. And, the interesting part is that they were able to harness the power of our online birdkeeping community to get this show off the ground and get donations of many items. Putting on a show requires a lot of money upfront, and the donation of awards and other materials for the show is an enormous help in getting a new show started.

I interviewed Ron and Tim (by email, of course!) about getting this show off the ground. I think the story of this fledgling bird show is evidence that people with common interests can still come together and create a community event. In addition, it's a great lesson in how modern channels of communication can be a help to community event planning, rather than a hindrance.

Interview with Ron Castaner and Tim McCormick

When did you start planning this show?

After the Treasure Coast Exotic Bird Club Regional NFSS show in Stuart Florida on 03-21-2010. Mr. Charles Tillman, the promoter and president of Exotic Bird Society of America, Inc. (Bird Brain of America) got in touch with us about putting on a show. He had attended the Treasure Coast Exotic Bird Club Expo, host to the NFSS regional show. Mr. Tillman runs the largest bird expo in Florida; he wanted to talk to me about doing a NFSS show in Orlando. We told Mr. Tillman that it was too expensive for one person to do. Normally clubs put on a show with the revenue they create doing the Bird Expo, and that is the only way it can be done. Ron explained to Mr. Tillman all the things it takes to run a NFSS show, or any other show for that matter, from judges expenses, ribbons & plaques, electricity, show benches, tables & chairs, a building that has to be rented, advertising, other minor things, not counting getting everyone together, secretarial paper work and someone to steward the show. After all the things I said, Tillman said to me how about if I give you the building, tables and chairs, electricity, air condition and all the advertising you need at no cost to you. Ron was very surprised and all he could say was he would get back to Mr. Tillman in a couple of days. Ron talked to Tim, who was all for it. The two of us thought about it some more and talked it over during the following week.

On 4-11-2010 Ron sent an-e-mail to John Wilson, Bob Peers and Bill Parlee asking their opinion on the NFSS show

I was planning for Florida. They were all for it and they would support the challenge. I also asked if I could ask the NFSS members to sponsor sections, they were all for this too.

Who was involved in planning? Who was the show committee?

Tim Mc Cormick, Carrie & Ron Castaner, with Mr. Charles Tillman's support as he gave us all the advertising, building that we need it to run the NFSS bird show.

Did it completely run on donations?

No, but most of it. Tim did the show bench at his cost. Ron did the rest of things that take to run the show at his cost: printing, color pictures, affiliation fee and lots of hours of computer work. It's hard with three people doing everything, but we got it done with Carrie's (Castaner) help. Carrie and Ron donated five pairs of Black Cheek Zebras from their collection for the raffle table to recoup some of the expenses.

Did you do the show in conjunction with another show or club?

Once we got all the facts together, Ron asked the NFSS members if they would donate the ribbons and plaques, and they say they would sponsor sections. Ron contacted Mr. Tillman to let him know that we would go ahead with the plans. At that time he said that probably they would have a Cockatiel and Parrot show at the same time. That was still in the works but most likely. They did have a Cockatiel and Parrot show along with the NFSS show the same day.


